

# Sometimes when we read a Gospel passage, it is possible to pick up a certain atmosphere or feeling when we immerse ourselves into the world of Jesus and his followers.

The rich man presents himself in front of Jesus today and one can sense the enthusiasm from him. He wants to join the entourage of followers and become a disciple of Jesus. 'What must I do?', he asks. The fatal question you might say! He's going to get an answer that will move him from enthusiasm to great sadness. 'Sell everything you have, give to the poor and come follow me,' says Jesus. The famous phrase that knocked the stuffing out of the rich man. We might find a certain portion of this Gospel scene entertaining as the man leaves Jesus and goes back to his life of great wealth. But the teaching is quite profound. Jesus turns to his followers, who have witnessed this scene and tells them that those who leave everything behind to follow Jesus, will be repaid a hundred times over. This is in recognition of the many sacrifices the disciples have made to follow Jesus on his journey to Jerusalem.
