GOSPEL

Jn 11:1-45

(For shorter form John 11:3-7, 17, 20-27, 33-45
read between ><)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to
John.

There was a man named Lazarus who lived in
the village of Bethany with his two sisters, Mary
and Martha, and he was ill. It was the same
Mary, the sister of the sick man Lazarus, who
anointed the Lord with ointment and wiped
his feet with her hair. >The sisters sent this
message to Jesus, "Lord, the man you love is
ill." On receiving the message, Jesus said, "This
sickness will end, not in death but in God's
glory, and through it the Son of God will be
glorified." Jesus loved Martha and her sister
and Lazarus; yet when he heard that Lazarus
was ill he stayed where he was for two more
days before saying to the disciples, "Let us go
to Judaea." < The disciples said, "Rabbi, it is not
long since the Jews wanted to stone you; are
you going back again?" Jesus replied;
"Are there not twelve hours in the day?
A man can walk in the daytime without
stumbling

because he has the light of this world to see by;
but if he walks at night he stumbles,
because there is no light to guide him."
He said that and then added, "Our friend
Lazarus is resting, I am going to wake him."
The disciples said to him, "Lord, if he is able to
rest he is sure to get better." The phrase Jesus
used referred to the death of Lazarus, but they
thought that by "rest" he meant "sleep," so
Jesus put it plainly, "Lazarus is dead; and for
your sake I am glad I was not there because
now you will believe. But let us go to him." Then
Thomas - known as the Twin - said to the other
disciples, "Let us go too, and die with him." >On
arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been
in the tomb for four days already. <Bethany
is only about two miles from Jerusalem, and
many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to
sympathise with them over their brother. >When
Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to
meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house.
Martha said to Jesus, "If you had been here, my
brother would not have died, but I know that,
even now, whatever you ask of God he will grant
you." "Your brother" said Jesus to her "will rise
again." Martha said, "I know he will rise again at
the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said:
"I am the resurrection, and the life.

If anyone believes in me, even though he dies
he will live,
and whoever lives and believes in me
will never die.
Do you believe this?"
"Yes, Lord," she said "I believe that you are the
Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to
come into this world." < When she had said this,
she went and called her sister Mary, saying in a
low voice, "The Master is here and wants to see
you." Hearing this, Mary got up quickly and went
to him. Jesus had not yet come into the village;
he was still at the place where Martha had met
him. When the Jews who were in the house
sympathising with Mary saw her get up so
quickly and go out, they followed her, thinking
that she was going to the tomb to weep there.
Mary went to Jesus, and as soon as she saw
him she threw herself at his feet, saying, "Lord,

if you had been here, my brother would not
have died." At the sight of her tears, and those
of the Jews who followed her, >Jesus said in
great distress, with a sigh that came straight
from the heart, "Where have you put him?"
They said, "Lord, come and see." Jesus wept;
and the Jews said, "See how much he loved
him!" But there were some who remarked, "He
opened the eyes of the blind man, could he not
have prevented this man's death?" Still sighing,
Jesus reached the tomb: it was a cave with a
stone to close the opening. Jesus said, "Take
the stone away." Martha said to him, "Lord, by
now he will smell; this is the fourth day." Jesus
replied, "Have I not told you that if you believe
you will see the glory of God?" So they took
away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes
and said:

"Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer.
I knew indeed that you always hear me,
but I speak
for the sake of all these who stand around me,
so that they may believe it was you who sent
me."
When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice,
"Lazarus, here! Come out!" The dead man came
out, his feet and hands bound with bands of
stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to
them "Unbind him, let him go free." Many of the
Jews who had come to visit Mary and had seen
what he did, believed in him.

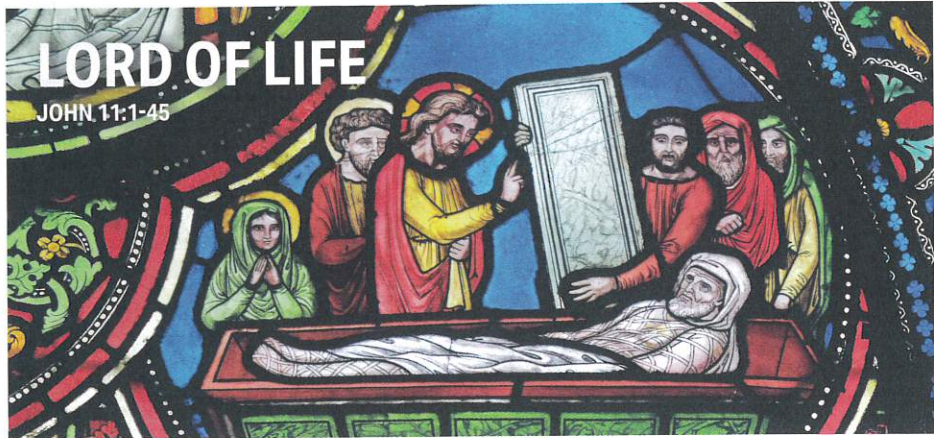
We pray, almighty God,

Sunday Message

FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

THE WORD

Year A • 22 March 2026 • Colour: Violet • Psalter Week 1



The story of the raising of Lazarus from the dead is the last great sign or miracle Jesus
works in John's Gospel. It is a powerful demonstration that Jesus is the life of the world.

Lazarus, a friend of Jesus, is ill. His sisters ask Jesus to come to see him. But Jesus delays a
while. By the time he finally arrives, Lazarus has already been in the tomb for four days. Upset
and disappointed, Lazarus's sister, Martha, goes to meet him. In the conversation that follows,
Jesus describes who he is and makes an astonishing promise: "I am the resurrection and the
life; whoever believes in me though he die, yet shall he live, and whoever lives and believes in
me shall never die."

Later, gathered around the tomb with Martha, Mary, his disciples and some friends who
had come to console the grieving sisters, Jesus works a sign to show his power and to
demonstrate that he is indeed the "resurrection and the life." He asks that the stone sealing
the tomb be removed. Then he prays, and bids Lazarus to come out. Still in his burial shroud,
Lazarus emerges alive.

For John, the raising of Lazarus is a sign that Jesus has the power to give eternal life. It is also a
promise that on the last day he will raise our mortal flesh.

Lazarus, the one whom Jesus loves, can be seen as representing all those whom Jesus loves.
Just as Jesus gave life to Lazarus, he gives life to us, too. This is the Good News. It is the very
foundation of our faith. ■

REFLECT

Our faith is a precious gift. Sometimes
we can forget just how extraordinarily
precious this faith of ours is, how
fragile. It's a gift we should treasure and never
take for granted.

Faith changes everything. In early 2022
Richard Gaillardetz was discussing with his
wife what to do when he retired in a few years
from his position as professor of systematic
theology at Boston University. He had been
dean of theology there as well as a former
president of the Theological Association of
America. He had a special interest in Vatican
II and had written and lectured widely on the
Council and its documents.

Richard was looking forward to his
retirement - and then all changed, changed
utterly. On 22/2/22 - a date he said was very

easy to remember - he was diagnosed with
pancreatic cancer and given a maximum of
18 months to live. On that day, all his plans
- for retirement, the books he was going to
write, the places he and his wife were going
to visit - went out the window. He had to
manage instead for his treatment and his
death. He had to put his affairs in order.

Richard began to write a blog about his
illness, which was published as a book after
his death. He died on November 7, 2023.
In the book *While I breathe, I hope*, Richard
writes beautifully about the consolation his
faith gave him as he approached his end. He
believed wholeheartedly in the Gospel, and
that belief sustained him to the last.

Richard Gaillardetz knew that the gift of
faith offers us two of the most wonderful

SAY

shape who you are? Can people see it?

LEARN

Our God is the God of life - not of death

The Christian believes in the resurrection of
the dead. This is at the core of our faith

The Christian opposes anything that is not
life-giving



consolations. First, the knowledge that
God is with us in every minute of every day,
and that with God by our side, there is no
trial, hardship or setback we cannot face
or overcome. God always holds us close.
God's loving presence always sustains us.

The second consolation is the promise of
eternal life. One of the most beautiful lines
in all of scripture assures us: "Eye has not
seen, nor ear heard, nor has entered into
the heart of people what God has prepared
for those who love him" (1 Cor 2:9). We
know that our death is not an exit to oblivion
but the threshold to a new, transformed,
glorified life with Christ in God forever.
When our time comes, however it comes,
we know, as Richard Gaillardetz knew, that
we need have no fear. ■
