GOSPEL

Matthew 14:13-21

A reading from the holy Gospel according to
Matthew.

When Jesus received the news of John the
Baptist's death he withdrew by boat to a lonely
place where they could be by themselves.
But the people heard of this and, leaving the
towns, went after him on foot. So as he stepped
ashore he saw a large crowd; and he took pity
on them and healed their sick. When evening
came, the disciples went to him and said, 'This
is a lonely place, and the time has slipped by; so
send the people away, and they can go to the
villages to buy themselves some food.' Jesus
replied, 'There is no need for them to go: give
them something to eat yourselves.' But they
answered 'All we have with us is five loaves and
two fish.' 'Bring them here to me' he said. He
gave orders that the people were to sit down on
the grass; then he took the five loaves and the
two fish, raised his eyes to heaven and said the
blessing. And breaking the loaves he handed
them to his disciples who gave them to the
crowds. They all ate as much as they wanted,
and they collected the scraps remaining, twelve
baskets full. Those who ate numbered about
five thousand men, to say nothing of women
and children.

will be successful, if only you stand fast.

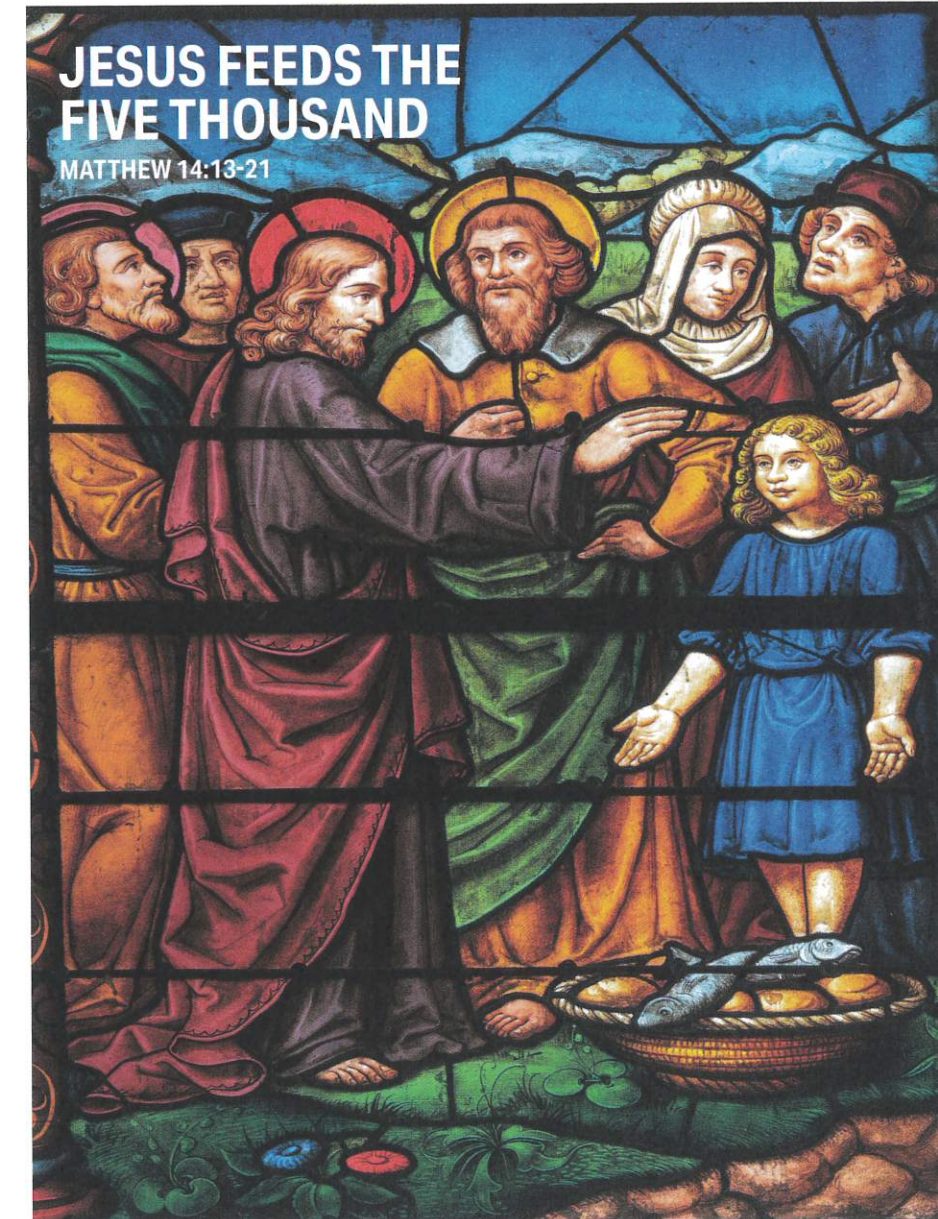

Sunday Message

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

THE WORD

JESUS FEEDS THE FIVE THOUSAND

MATTHEW 14:13-21

In this passage, we witness Jesus' compassion in action. Upon hearing of John the Baptist's death, he withdraws to a quiet place, yet the crowds follow him. Seeing their need, "he had compassion on them and healed their sick." Jesus' concern is both spiritual and physical — he attends to their suffering, showing that God's care embraces every aspect of human life.

The miracle of the feeding highlights the abundance of God's providence. With only five loaves and two fish, Jesus blesses the small offering, distributes it to the crowd, and everyone eats their fill. The leftover fragments emphasize that God's generosity is overflowing and cannot be exhausted. The disciples' participation in distributing the food demonstrates the partnership between divine action and human response.

Matthew presents this event as a sign of the Kingdom: God provides for his people, satisfies their needs, and invites cooperation in his work. It also prefigures the Eucharist, where Christ gives himself as spiritual nourishment. The passage calls readers to trust in God's providence, offer what they have, and participate actively in sharing his love and care with others. ■

REFLECT

Jesus heals the sick and cares for them, showing that discipleship begins with attentiveness to the suffering around us. Faith is not only belief but action: seeing the needs of others and responding with love.

The miracle of the feeding of the five thousand reminds us that God can transform even our smallest efforts into abundance. The disciples' simple offering of five loaves and two fish, given to Jesus, becomes enough to satisfy thousands. This teaches that nothing we offer — no act of kindness, prayer, or generosity — is too small for God to use.

We are invited to participate in God's work today. Small gestures of care, encouragement, or sharing what we have can have greater impact than we imagine. Jesus shows that when we bring our limited resources and trust them to God, they are multiplied, and everyone benefits. Discipleship calls us to compassionate action, to notice needs, and to offer what we can, trusting God to provide abundantly and transform ordinary efforts into blessings. ■

LEARN

God calls us to participate in his work of compassion, and that even small offerings, when entrusted to Christ, can be multiplied to meet the needs of others.

DO

Bring what little you have — time, talent, or resources — and trust God to use it to bless others.

SAY

Little things done with great love
